Next Sunday is Palm Sunday, the final Sunday in Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. It commemorates the arrival of Jesus Christ in Jerusalem before His crucifixion.

According to the Scriptures, Jesus chose to ride a donkey as a sign of humility with townspeople throwing clothes and palm fronds in front of him as a sign of homage — a traditional custom at the time for people of great respect.

Within days, Jesus would be dead, dying on a large wooden cross on Calvary, only to rise again three days later.

Next week we will celebrate this monumental chain of events which changed the world.

Palm Sunday Communion services will be held at 7.30am in All Saints and 10am in St Mary's.

On the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Evening Prayer services will be held in St Mary's starting at 6pm.

On Thursday, we celebrate Maundy Thurs-

day in St Mary's at 7pm. Maundy Thursday is the day of the Last Supper, when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and established the ceremony known as Eucharist

It also marks the day when Jesus was betrayed by Judas in the Garden of Gathsemane.

On Good Friday, the holiest of days, there will be an open air service of Holy Communion at All Saints, starting at 9am. Passion readings will be read by three parishioners from each of the two church congregations.

The Resurrection is celebrated on Easter Sunday (April 17), with Communion services in All Saints at 7.30am and 10am in St Mary's. Please ty to support these special Holy Week services.

LENTEN STUDIES: We are nearly at an end. Rob and Kaye are attending a wedding on Saturday (April 9) so Rob suggests one or two participants can pick a Psalm from the study and lead the All Saints discussion on that day.

COVED RESTRICTIONS EASED: You no longer need to scan or sign in attending church. However, we must still wear masks and abide by social distance requirements. Please care for others and stay home if you are unwell. At this stage we will also continue to take Holy Communion in one kind.

The traditions of Easter

EASTER EGGS: According to tradition, these are said to represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb; a new life.

Decorating eggs at Easter dates back to at least the 13th century.

The Easter egg tradition may also have been derived from the end of Lenten fasting. Eggs were originally forbidden during Lent, along with other dairy products, flour etc (used up on Shrove Tuesday Pancake Day). But hens don't stop producing eggs during Lent so a larger than usual supply would have been available at the end of the fasting period.

It was also customary to hard boil eggs to preserve them until they could be eaten around

Easter time. It was traditional to decorate the eggs and use them as gifts at Easter. Originally they were decorated with



dye, but modern custom is to use chocolate eggs wrapped in foil or plastic eggs filled with chocolates.

HOT CROSS BUNS: These originally recognised Jesus' crucifixion and to mark the end of the Lenten fasting period. They were decorated on top with a cross made from flour paste, representing the cross on which Jesus died. And the spices used in them were said to be symbolic of the spices used to embalm Jesus after His death.
